sometimes hums along with the songs as he strolls about the meeting. To further illustrate community, the Worship Team taught those interested

in participating, The Community Song (Roll it Over the Ocean) along with fun and sometimes difficult hand motions. This song is one that is sung frequently in our Faith & Light meetings. Each verse, begins with "It's me", "It's you", "It's us", "It's Christ" or "It's love", answers the question, "Who builds community?" ### Remembering Garland Kyger and Butch Boyers

Nancy Hopkins-Garriss tells the story of Garland's arrival at Yoder house in 1995. He wasn't sure about moving to an unfamiliar place until he saw a seat on the back deck out in the full sun. He then made his way outside and sat

there content to be in a place that would soon be his new home. He loved nothing more than to sit in the summer sun or walk in the green grass, pausing to pull clumps of grass and clutching it tightly. I like to think of Jesus having prepared a place like that for Garland. It is a custom made place with a porch swing in the sun and miles of green grass to pull in the back yard.

#### **Butch**

Butch was created to bring God glory! He did this well by living a full and vibrant life. He loved people and never knew a stranger, always wanting to shake hands and often offering a kiss. Most of all, Butch loved his family and friends. He always carried a photo album around and would show anyone who showed some interest the many pictures of himself with his sisters, with some friend or next to a racecar or motorcycle.

In Isaiah 43, God promises to be with his people and to bring them home from wherever they had been scattered. I love that this passage ends with the words, "They are my own people, and I created them to bring me glory."


