Intellectual Disabilities Since 1971

Learning From the Lives of Those We Have Lost

The Pleasant View community has recently experienced two deaths. Each person's passing leaves a hole in the fabric of our community. I would like to reflect a bit on some of the colorful threads they brought into the weave of community we experience here.

When **Gary Sheets** (October 25, 1945-November 4, 2017) came to Pleasant View's Harrison House from Western State Hospital in 1992, he kept a cautious distance from others. He moved to Moyers Apartments and later to Yoder House when he needed an accessible home. Gary had autism, which shaped how he related to the world and those around him. He was not a verbal communicator and seemed to like his world small and manageable, but there were a few exceptions.



One exceptional day was the day Gary was baptized. After attending Trinity Presbyterian Church for a few years, he still kept a safe distance from people, but let those who knew and understood him know that he wanted to take the membership classes

and be baptized. On the day of his baptism, when asked if he took Jesus to be his Lord and Savior, Nancy Hopkins-Garriss, Executive Director, says church members witnessed Gary clearly reply "YES." This was the only time many who knew Gary ever heard him speak words. After the baptismal ceremony, he accepted handshakes and hugs from his community of faith in spite of his usual reticence to being touched. It gives me comfort to know that God loosed his tongue and his usual reticence so that he could give witness to his deep faith in this way.

Aubrey Watson (December 3, 1953-November 12, 2017) died just shy of his 64th birthday. He spent much of his life at CVTC before moving to Harrison House in 1995.

Although Aubrey did not have great wealth or verbal abilities, he had something more. He had the kind of contentment



Paul writes about in 1 Timothy 6:6-7 where we read, "true godliness with contentment is itself great wealth. ⁷ After all, we brought nothing with us when we came into the world, and we can't take anything with us when we leave it. ⁸ So if we have enough food and clothing, let us be content." Aubrey was very wealthy when it came to this kind of contentment.

I recognized this contentment in his eyes and on his face as he expressed great joy at being home after an extended stay in the hospital. Aubrey's contentment was contagious. He would share his contentment with others with a smile, shake his head, and laugh. When sitting with a friend, he would sometimes gently touch their shoulder or cheek and gaze into their eyes resulting in a feeling of connection that briefly took one out of their busy day. It strikes me as significant that Aubrey had a unique way to show the world something important about God. God invites each of us to find community and contentment within the circles we are placed in.

Often we spend so much time trying to find contentment elsewhere that we miss out on the gifts right in front of us. Our society rushes by wonderful people just because they do not have a voice or appear to be impaired. Quality time spent with Gary and Aubrey was always an invitation to slow down and reorient oneself to the important things in life. Is it not remarkable that it takes individuals like Gary and Aubrey to teach us this important lesson? How many people miss that chance?
